

students have been doing in the different areas of the curriculum.


Thank you for all your kind words and your support through this difficult term – your understanding and flexibility have been greatly appreciated.



As I look back on the term, we have had our challenges, but what has seen us through is that steadfast belief that good will prevail. What we are experiencing – whether this be the pandemic, grief, loss, anger, restrictions or frustration – we know that there is light in the darkness and that soon the

It is still cold outside so please can you continue to ensure that all students bring the correct kit for their PE lessons. We expect students to be wearing full Holywell PE kit for all lessons including:

- Black shorts / jogging bottoms / leggings
- A Holywell polo top
- A Holywell rugby top / fleece and / or mid-layer
- Long black socks / white sports socks.

English Department News

We have had a wonderful term in English and have loved having the pupils back enjoying some fantastic literature and producing some stunning pieces of writing.

Year Five

Year Five have been studying 'Kensuke's Kingdom' by Michael Morpurgo.

They have settled in really well and have written some amazing recounts about their new school; some discussion texts on whether they would like to sail around the world; descriptive writing from the perspective of an orang-utan; some haiku poetry; some non-fiction writing about WWII in the pacific and an emotional letter from Kensuke to his son. We are now beginning to look at our next main unit- 'Passion for Poetry'

<u>Year Six</u>

We weren't able to go on our traditional September trip to Wrest Park this year but will hopefully be able to re-arrange the visit for early spring. Nonetheless, we had a fabulous time looking at how to write a discursive essay- the pupils looked at whether they should have limited screen time and whether the prime-minister was correct to lock-down the country at the end of March. The pupils really enjoyed looking at arguments that were relevant to their own lives and produced some very mature writing.

We have been reading some marvellous contemporary fiction by Eva Ibbotson-'Journey to the River Sea'. The children have enjoyed following the adventures of Maia, Clovis and Finn in Brazil- linking in well with their rainforest work in Geography.



They have written some really impressive descriptions of being 'Lost in the Jungle' and some formal letters.

We will now be moving on to some more non-fiction writing and our next major unit on 'The Greek Myths'

Year Seven

We began Year Seven with our 'Fantasy Worlds' project where

the pupils got to be really creative and write in lots of different

text types around the theme of an amazing alien world of their own creation. We have then been reading the novel 'Holes' by Louis Sachar. This has been hugely enjoyed by pupils and several

have told me that it is 'the best book they have ever read'!

They have written short stories,

autobiographies, newspaper reports, essaystyle extended answers, informal letters, factual reports and play-scripts.

We are just about to get started on our persuasive writing unit- 'The Balloon Debate'




Year Eight

Year Eight had a spooky start to the year, looking at 'GothicHorror'. They looked at lots of classic horror stories such as Dracula and Frankenstein and

looked at how to build suspense and the conventions of this kind of writing. This culminated with them writing some superb gothic stories of their own.

This led on to our major unit on Charles Dickens and his novella 'A Christmas Carol'. They have written persuasive letters, factual reports and obituaries and are just embarking on a major essay in response to the text. They have enjoyed the challenge of some Victorian literature over the term.

Thanks for all your support for the English Department and remember - 20-30 minutes of reading every night makes a huge difference to pupil outcomes if you can try and find the time.

Library Lessons

As I am sure you are aware, we have restarted library lessons at Holywell. Can I take this opportunity to say a big thank-you to our librarian, Miss Watson, for all of her hard work in making sure pupils can borrow books safely in these difficult circumstances. Please be assured we are following all government guidelines and books are quarantined on return before going back onto the shelves.



I thought it would be useful to explain to parents how our library system works. **Pupils have one library lesson every two weeks**. This is always on the same day and they have the dates written into their organisers. During this lesson, they have the opportunity to choose **two fiction and one non-fiction book**. We are very proud of our library which has a large range of books which will hopefully suit all tastes and abilities. The pupils have a good amount of time to choose and there are adults in the room to help them make appropriate choices.

We would hope that pupils can try and read their fiction book in the two weeks before their next lesson. We have ten minutes in the morning and at least ten minutes during afternoon registration where pupils have independent reading time - plus currently pupils have five minutes at the beginning of most lessons while Covid procedures are carried out when they should read quietly. So over the two weeks they have 4-5 hours reading time in school and should be able to read much of their book in this time.

We do, however, strongly encourage independent reading at home and would hope families could find 20-30 minutes on a few evenings each week for some quiet reading. Evidence shows that reading for pleasure makes a huge difference to pupils' academic outcomes.

Pupils are asked to complete a short 'review' on their reading for the next library lesson. This is a short paragraph in their reading record and should only take 10-15 minutes. It just needs to say what they enjoyed about the book and maybe a few comments on characters and plot. Ideally, this is just a starting point for a conversation with an adult during the lesson, so we can discuss their independent reading (although current restrictions are making this difficult).

If they did not enjoy their fiction book from the library and only read the first few chapters- that is fine! They can just explain why they didn't like it and maybe tell us a little about any books they read instead. If they don't finish their book, again they can just write a few sentences on what they have read and then renew the book during their library lesson or choose a brand new one. The very last thing we would want is for children to feel that reading is a chore. We really just want to have some idea of what they are reading so we can help them find books they enjoy!

Science Department News

<u>Euan (Year 5)</u>

I have really enjoyed learning about the Earth, sun and moon and how we get day and night. We have also enjoyed my lessons on states of matter – solids, liquids and gases. I particularly enjoyed going outside and modelling the particles and collecting evidence to prove that air is actually real.



Alice and Seth (Year 6)

At the beginning of the year, we started our first topic: evolution and inheritance. We learnt about adaptations, what happened to peppered moths during the industrial revolution and this helped us learn about natural selection. I also enjoyed learning about fossils, Charles Darwin and his journey on the HMS Beagle to the Galapagos Islands to study the finches.

We have moved on to learn about light and what it does in transparent, translucent and opaque objects. We have also covered mirrors, reflections and shadows. I really enjoyed investigating how shadows can change in size.....a very fun topic!



Chloe and Erin (Year 7)

This term we have covered biology topics, which we have found interesting. We have built cell models, and learnt about specialised cells like red blood cells, white blood cells, sperm cells and many more. We like learning about what is going on in our own bodies.

We have also learnt about the reproductive systems of plants and humans. We have found it interesting learning about how babies are made and are born.



<u>Ryan (Year 8)</u>

We have enjoyed learning different topics so far this year but my favourite was learning about the effects of drugs, alcohol and smoking on the body. I never realised how much they can affect the brain! We have also learned lots about the digestive system and all of the organs involved....from chew to poo! I have found it useful to know what makes up a balanced diet and I think more people should understand what makes a healthy diet. I have also enjoyed learning about the acid bath murderer – George Haigh, and making my own pH indicator from red cabbage.



Bedford Food Bank Challenge

Key Stage 2 Challenge



Thinking of this month's values of thankfulness, Key Stage 2 was challenged to come up with a way of how we could show thankfulness. Years 5 and 6 were asked to show their appreciation for all that their community has done by collecting items for the Bedford Foodbank. Holywell Music Department strives to 'Keep Music Live'

COVID-19 has posed some unique challenges for musicians and the thoughts of music department remain with colleagues and friends in the industry at this most difficult and challenging of times.



Working restrictions during COVID-19 have certainly kept us on our toes here in

school this term! However, we are proud to have been able to keep delivering safe and secure practical music lessons for all students. This has required some creative thinking about how to use spaces and resources leading to some unusual ways of doing things. For instance, who would have thought that Year 8 would have become so proficient at playing Adele on Boomwhackers or being proficient with a range of percussion instruments ... and Year 7



mastering playing Mozart concertos on Ukuleles was both brilliant and bizarre!

Curriculum lessons

Students have explored a wide range different musical pieces and styles this term whilst learning about the elements of Music. Year 5 students have learnt about pitch, rhythm and notation.

We have also introduced Samba into our curriculum, having been lucky enough to secure some funding from the UKUMF Sound Foundation right before the beginning of lockdown. At the start of September, a full Samba Kit arrived from Brazil (although it did get lost along the way!) and Holywell has certainly got the Samba 'bug'. In October, 8RS enjoyed the challenge of performing their work outside while walking around the school:

If your child is away from School

A telephone call is required on the first day of absence, before 10.00 am.

The Office Staff prepare the official registers and need to know the reason for <u>all</u> absences. It is therefore important that they are made aware of absences and they will inform your child's Form Teacher.

Please could parents remind pupils to <u>report to the office</u> if they arrive at school after registration. Pupils leaving school during the day, for whatever reason, must also use the front entrance to the school and sign out.

Christingle

Thanks to our friends at Cranfield Church (St Peter and St Paul's Church) and thanks to Cranfield Co-op, all Year 5 students had the opportunity to create their own Christingle. A Christingle is a symbolic object used in Christian Advent services. Christingle comes from a word of German origin, <u>Christkindl</u>, meaning 'Little Christ Child'. Each element of a Christingle has a special meaning and helps to tell the Christian story:

- The orange represents the world
- The red ribbon (or tape) symbolises the love and blood of Christ
- The sweets and dried fruit represent all of God's creations
- The lit candle represents Jesus's light in the world, bringing hope to people living in darkness.

PRACTICAL REMINDERS



- **Hydration Guidance**: All students should have a water bottle (labelled) and they are encouraged to take regular sips during the day.
 - o Bottles must be anti-spill bottles NOT GLASS with sports tops
 - Water bottles should be carried separately from school books and library books
 - Water bottles are not allowed near electrical equipment
 - Water bottles and drinks must be for personal use only
 - Teachers have the final word in lessons as to when and if they can be used
 - Bottles must contain still WATER! Flavoured still water or sugar-free squash is also an acceptable alternative, however, water is best! (Fizzy drinks – including sparkling water drinks or power drinks – are not allowed in school.)
- **Uniform** If you are refreshing uniform over Christmas, please make sure that the correct uniform is purchased ready to be smart in January. Make sure that shoes are shoes (no trainers)! Trousers and skirts should be grey and not black; skirts should be the correct length.
- **Chewing Gum** Chewing gum is **not** allowed and should not be brought into school.
- **Mobile Phone Policy** Reminder that we are now a non-smart-phone school. Smart phones are not to be brought on-site. Non-smart phones for communicating with parents out of school hours are allowed with a permission slip and are the responsibility of the child. If smart-phones are found on-site, they will be confiscated and will need to be collected by a parent. Full policy on the website.
- Behaviour To / From school and on the buses we expect the same high standards of student behaviour on the bus and walking to and from school. Students should also make sure they are behaving safely at all times eg. seat belts on, walking a safe distance away from the pavement, not crossing in front of vehicles, etc.
- **Haircuts** Keep it professional! No fashion cuts, no lines or patterns, no colours, nothing shorter than Grade #2.
