Science Department News

What a brilliant first term we have had in the science department at Holywell! It has been action-packed with students in all years embarking on their new learning journey.

In September, we welcomed our new **Year Five** students and they quickly settled into life at Holywell. Their year began with a focus on developing practical skills. It was wonderful to see the students estimating, measuring, and recording whilst carrying out lots of practical work – something we missed throughout the previous year. Our 'working scientifically' focus continued during our next topic where students excelled in modelling the three states of matter – acting as particles on the playground and organising themselves into the correct particle arrangement. Bravo! Year Five.

Year Six started the year learning about reversible and irreversible changes. They quickly

developed observational skills looking for evidence that chemical reactions had taken place. Have you ever thought about why the statue of liberty is green? When the statue was constructed it was a shiny, golden copper colour. Over the years, the copper reacted with gases and water in the air to give liberty her 'green' copper carbonate coating!




The highlight of the first term for many students in Year Six was earning their Bunsen burner licence! To achieve this important milestone, students had to demonstrate a secure understanding of safety in the lab, set up a Bunsen burner correctly, light it safely and use it to investigate the burning time of various materials. An anxious time for some transformed into confidence and we were thrilled with the effort shown by all students.

In Year Seven, we began the year studying cells and life processes. Students made

fantastic cell models and developed their knowledge and understanding of cell structure and function. Using the department microscopes inspired many students as we zoomed into the magical microscopic world!

Year Eight thoroughly enjoyed our Health and lifestyle topic at the beginning of the year.



Studying

diet and nutrition, food testing, and the digestive system made learning relevant to everyday life. There were

many inspired pieces of work showing the 'Journey of a cheese sandwich'!

The highlight for many students was our work on acids and alkalis.

Chemistry always provides the 'Harry Potter' moments, the magic of reactions! Testing various substances with different indicators produced a rainbow of colours and an appreciation of the acidity and alkalinity of everyday items.



Year Eight have also been learning about static electricity and circuits. Hair-raising! Electrifying! They applied their knowledge of circuits by designing and building a steady hand game.

From the English Department

Year Five

Year Five have been enjoying the wonderful Michael Morpurgo novel- 'Kensuke's Kingdom'. They have produced some incredible informal letters and descriptive writing, including writing from the perspective of an orang-utan! We are now getting started on our 'Passion for Poetry' unit.

<u>Year Six</u>

Year Six started the term with their work around WWI and our

highly enjoyable visit to Wrest Park. This culminated in some really impressive narrative writing called the 'Soldier's Story' describing the journey of a WWI solider from the trenches to recuperation at Wrest Park. There are some amazing examples from each group on display in the entrance hall.

We then looked at writing some high-quality non-fiction in the form of balanced arguments: we looked at questions such as 'Should students have to wear school uniform?' and 'Should KS2 students have screen time limited to one hour per day?' We are now well underway with reading a superb contemporary novel- 'Journey to the River Sea' by Eva Ibbotson.

<u>Year Seven</u>

Year Seven began with an immersive creative writing unit based around creating their own fantasy world. They have then enjoyed the hugely popular Louis Sachar novel 'Holes'. They have learnt about the historical background of racism in America in the late 19th century and written in variety of styles including letters, newspapers and factual reports. We will move on to looking at persuasive speeches in the new year.

<u>Year Eight</u>

Year eight have worked very hard on two main units this term. The first was 'Gothic Horror' where they looked at classic and modern 'gothic' stories. They then wrote their own spine-chilling tales of terror!

This half-term has been dedicated to Charles Dickens' 'A Christmas Carol'. They have read the novella, written some super persuasive letters calling for the cancellation of Christmas and are now writing some very impressive essays. Our next unit is the gripping contemporary novel- 'Stone Cold' by Robert Swindells.

Homework and Independent Reading

As I am sure you will have noticed, English homeworks are now almost entirely based around reading tasks. There has been a great response from students and the vast majority are completing their reading each week.

If I could just ask you to make sure that they are completing these tasks at homewhich would also include at least 20 minutes each day reading either independently or to an adult. All the evidence shows that nothing has a bigger impact on child's academic achievement than regular reading for pleasure!





PRACTICAL <u>REMINDERS</u>



- **Hydration Guidance**: All students should have a water bottle (labelled) and they are encouraged to take regular sips during the day.
 - Bottles must be anti-spill bottles NOT GLASS with sports tops
 - Water bottles should be carried separately from school books and library books
 - Water bottles are not allowed near electrical equipment
 - Water bottles and drinks must be for personal use only
 - Teachers have the final word in lessons as to when and if they can be used
 - Bottles must contain still WATER! Flavoured still water or sugar-free squash is also an acceptable alternative, however, water is best! (Fizzy drinks – including sparkling water drinks or power drinks – are not allowed in school.)
- Uniform In order to represent our community appropriately it is important that our pupils wear the correct school uniform with pride and look well presented at all times. Below is a reminder of our school uniform and expectations. PE Kit should only be worn into school on days where pupils have PE. If you are refreshing uniform over Christmas, please make sure that the correct uniform is purchased ready to be smart in January. Make sure that shoes are shoes (no trainers)! Trousers and skirts should be grey and not black; skirts should be the correct length ie. BELOW the knee.

- **Chewing Gum** Chewing gum is **not** allowed and should not be brought into school.
- **Mobile Phone Policy** Reminder that we are a non-smart-phone school. Smart phones are not to be brought on-site. Non-smart phones for communicating with parents out of school hours are allowed with a permission slip and are the responsibility of the child. If smart-phones are found on-site, they will be confiscated and will need to be collected by a parent. Full policy on the website.
- Behaviour To / From school and on the buses we expect the same high standards of student behaviour on the bus and walking to and from school. Students should also make sure they are behaving safely at all times eg. seat belts on, walking a safe distance away from the pavement, not crossing in front of vehicles, etc.
- **Haircuts** Keep it professional! No fashion cuts, no lines or patterns, no colours, nothing shorter than Grade #2.
- Essential Equipment Having the right equipment in school is essential to pupils demonstrating that they are ready to learn and taking their lessons seriously. Whilst we understand that everyone forgets things from time to time, we're seeing an increasing number of occasions where pupils are not bringing any, or consistently missing key pieces of equipment into school. We'd like to therefore take this opportunity to remind pupils that it is their responsibility to ensure that they have the correct equipment in lessons and that they come into school ready to learn. We've updated the list of what is essential below and would appreciate your support in ensuring that pupils come to school with the correct equipment.

 - A whiteboard pen
