This week say the return of our annual Charity Fayre. Students worked in House groups to devise and create stalls and on Wednesday afternoon, we all had a chance to raise some money for two wonderful charities:

We had everything from bake sales to face painting, from football challenges to naming bears, from a piratical lucky dip (including having to walk the plank beforehand) to smoothies, sausages, pizza, crafts, nail-painting ... and many other inventive activities. The final total raised was: £1,576.15





In May, our Year 6 students faced their SATs by creating SATs monsters. We have just had their provisional results and they have all done really well. As ever, we have a wide range of abilities in the year group and everyone has made progress since the start of the year in spite of the disruption to their normal teaching during the pandemic. Some had extra support through school-led tuition and most just worked exceptionally hard with their class teachers to 'be the best they could be'. The overall provisional results were as follows:

It was also very heartening to be able to welcome our new intake students to Holywell for our first full 'in person' induction in two years and we are very hopeful that the next generation of Holywell students will be as dynamic, surprising, talented, unique and just as wonderful as our current students – they certainly impressed us during their 2-day induction.

So, as the year draws to a close, may I take this opportunity to wish everyone a restful Summer break. Good luck to all the Holywell students moving on to different schools – be this in Year 8 or in any other year group – may you always take the Holywell spirit with you – living the Holywell values, being the best you can be and doing so as part of whatever new community you find yourselves in. #### **Hairstyles**

It should be noted that the school does not accept extreme haircuts or colours. Patterns and track-lines should not be cut into hair. Hair should not be cut shorter than a no 2. If you are in any doubt about the validity of a hairstyle, please contact the school before getting the hair-cut.

#### Jewellery and Make-up

To avoid any dangers or loss or accident to the wearer or other student, expensive items must not be worn. No necklaces or bracelets are permitted unless they are part of your religious faith. One plain ring is allowed. Earrings - plain studs, only one in each earlobe, these must be removed for PE/Games lessons. Make-up is not allowed.

## PE Kit for PE Days

After consultation with students, parents and staff we have decided to keep our Covid-19 policy of requiring students to come to school in PE kit on their timetabled PE days. To help try and make sure that everyone has the correct and most appropriate kit for PE lessons in September, please see the list above of kit that is required throughout the school year.

Students might also wish to bring spare kit in with them, in case they get wet/muddy during their lesson.

## **Attendance and Holidays in Term Time**




Parents / Carers should be aware that under current government guidelines we can <u>NOT</u> give permission for any holiday in term time. Holidays will be classed as unauthorised absence for your child. There may, however, be events that a student takes part in out of school which require him / her to miss a school day – we will continue to consider that sort of request. However, it is clear that the government and external authorities will want a very persuasive argument for us to be allowed to record any absence as a permitted

time out of school. No leave will be authorised during the first two weeks of the school year or during exam periods.

**Parents/carers wishing to apply for leave of absence** are required to fill in a **Leave of Absence Application Form** in advance and before making any travel arrangements (available from the school office and to download from the school website). We always take a reasonable, supportive approach to requests (especially with regard to fines) however, taking 'the odd day' here and there can have a HUGE impact on learning.

## News from the History and R.E. Departments

The **History** department has been busy this term with **Year 5** learning about the Ancient Romans. Our main assessment looked at causation as we analysed reasons why the Romans were so successful. The students enjoyed this topic, particularly finding out all the gruesome details of gladiator games and chariot racing!

**Year 6** are coming to the end of their topic on the Ancient Maya and have found many of their customs and aspects of culture fascinating. In particular, we have been considering how and why this civilization that evolved totally separately from the western world could have similarities with it.

**Year 7** have moved on to look at the Stuart dynasty this half term, finding out why the English Civil War broke out that culminated in the execution of Charles I.

In **Year 8** we have been asking how and why women gained the vote and analysing the importance of the suffrage movement compared to the amazing contribution played by women in the war effort. Many students have made exceptional progress this year and we wish them continuing success as they continue their journey in their new schools in September.

In **RE** lessons **Year 5** have been looking at aspects of worship across many different faiths. We have looked at pilgrimage in more detail and learnt about different pilgrimage sites around the world.



**Year 6** have immersed themselves into the 'island' unit, learning about important rites of passage along the way. Their learning has centred mostly on identifying symbolism within religious ceremonies and considering how and why

these ceremonies differ across religions and denominations. They were very much looking forward to the

'mock wedding' that we were due to hold on Tuesday at St Peter and St Paul's church – unfortunately, due to the extreme weather, we had to bring the church to Holywell. Rev. Isaac officiated the service in the Macfarlan Room!




**Year 7** have been looking at racism and discrimination and recognising that all world religions not only promote equality but also work actively to eradicate racism and prejudice from our society.

Finally, our **Year 8**'s have ended their studies in religious education with an extended personal research project on a religion or denomination of their choice. We wish them all the best as they move onto their Upper Schools next term.

## **Science Department News**

As we come to the end of the academic year, we reflect and look forward to the future with ambition and a determination to achieve personal success.


In the final half term, Year Five students engaged brilliantly with our topic on microbes. We began with a glimpse of the microscopic world. Students learned about how our




ideas change over time and the importance of theories and evidence when working scientifically. We learned about the plague doctors of the 17<sup>th</sup> century, through to modern day microscopes and microorganisms. Students were fascinated (if a little 'grossed out') by the diverse types of diseases and symptoms caused by microbes. They produced some wonderful pieces of writing about Edward Jenner and his work on smallpox. Many made the link between Jenner's work on vaccinations

and our efforts to develop vaccines during the COVID pandemic. Students investigated the conditions needed to keep yeast alive and how microorganisms are used to make food. Finally, we had a closer look at the process of decay and how it can be harmful but also useful.

Year Six continued their work on 'Living things and their habitats.' They delved into the world of classification, discovered the tree of life, and considered our need to give a sense of order to the world around us. The students enjoyed finding out about food chains and food webs and how organisms are interdependent on each other in their fragile ecosystems. More recently, Year Six have been learning about light. They investigated the properties of light, mirrors, shadows, and reflection. We congratulate Year Six for reaching the end of Key Stage Two and give our best wishes to those students moving to a new school. For those who are continuing their education at Holywell, we look forward to developing our scientific knowledge and understanding together in Key Stage Three!




Year Seven students have been studying forces and their effects; building on the work they did in Year Five. An intense focus on practical skills enabled the students to working their approach scientifically. Investigations into Hooke's law, drag and friction, magnetism, and balanced and unbalanced forces helped to reinforce the importance of working



collaboratively. In the second half of the term, students switched to look at the structure and function of body systems. Here, they

learned about the levels of organisation of living things (cells, tissues, organs, and systems.) The students particularly enjoyed their work on modelling various body systems.

In their final half term at Holywell, Year Eight students have focussed on Green plants, and Separation techniques. Both topics involved lots of practical work. In the Green plants' topic, students investigated seed germination, conducted a bean dissection, tested leaves for starch and fruits for glucose, and learned about seed dispersal methods. In their work on separation techniques, the students looked at mixtures and solubility and used filtration, evaporation, distillation, and chromatography to separate various substances.



We would like to take this opportunity to wish all Year Eight students the very best for the next stage of their learning journey. As we say goodbye, we are safe in the knowledge that they are well-prepared for the challenges of upper school. We hope that every student aims high, works hard, and seizes every opportunity. Good luck Year Eight...The Class of 2022!


