


Our sponsored walk was a great success and we raised an amazing £2,479. I had the pleasure of walking with Year 7 and we did the route in a record time! The money raised was for the PTFA who are hoping to raise funds towards the lease of a new mini-bus. We have a new PTFA committee

and we are grateful to Mrs Himsworth and Mrs Cooke for taking a lead on this – watch out for future events – including the return of Hot

Chocolate days.

Year 6 have been developing their 'working scientifically' skills and got to put their practical skills to the test with an investigation into how different materials react with fire.





Year 5 have been exploring graphic scores in Music and coming up with some wonderful performances. They also had to nominate someone to conduct the whole performance!



We have continued to develop our community time work. Students have an extended 'check-in' on Mondays and Fridays and they have a Community Time focus session with their Tutor Group each week. Students develop their social skills and get to know each other in their tutor group communities. This half-term they have worked on developing their own 'commitments' for the

term, commitments which will enable everyone in the group (and in school) to learn effectively and

'be the best they can be'. We have also looked at what our values mean in practice and what we can do to show these values. This month's focus has also been linked to October's Black



History Month with students exploring the life-story of Mary Seacole. Mary Seacole was born in Jamaica more than 200 years ago. This was during the period when many black people in the Caribbean were forced to work as slaves. Although Mary's mother was black, her father James Grant was a white Scottish army officer and Mary was born a 'free person'. Mary set up the "British Hotel" behind the lines during the Crimean War. She

described the hotel as "a mess-table and comfortable quarters for sick and convalescent officers", and provided care for wounded service men on the battlefield, nursing many of them back to health. Mary Seacole is a great role model. Her values of good citizenship (she always wanted to help the sick and wounded), entrepreneurship (her drive took her to the Crimea under her own steam) and achievement (she remains one of history's greatest figures) hold true today. Mary was reported to have been given a medal for her service and bravery during the Crimean War; unfortunately, historians now believe this to be inaccurate, although she is often pictured wearing medals. Students were challened to design a service medal for someone in our school community who deserves recognition for their service. Students have recognised a wide range of people – from class colleagues to teachers, from office staff to the site team, from the kitchen team to members of our safeguarding and wellbeing team ... and everyone else in between-you may have even received one at home.

Reverend Isaac who is the rector in charge of St Peter and St Paul's Church in Cranfield has written a lovely reflection on 'Service' – he writes these reflections mainly for staff so they can help ground their work with students in biblical references .. they are always worth a wider audience.

Service is a central feature of Christianity. But in the past, before Jesus, all religions and philosophies taught that it was natural for the weaker of society to serve the stronger. For example, Plato, the father of all Western philosophy once wrote: "Nature herself intimates that it is just for the better to have more than the worse, the more powerful than the weaker. Justice consists in the superior ruling over and having more than the inferior."

So, imagine the shock and surprise when Jesus came, claiming to be God in flesh, and said: "I have come not to be served, but to serve." (Mark 10:45). The Creator of the universe came to earth not to be served by others, but to serve others. The Apostle Paul takes the example of Jesus and instructs the early Christian community to follow it. He writes: "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others. In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus: who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; rather, he made himself

nothing by taking the very nature of a servant." (Philippians 2). Paul's point is clear, and pretty stark; if God humbled himself to take on the role of a servant, how much more should we be those who seek out ways of serving one another.

It has also been delightful to see a lot of Holywell students attending the every-growing and popular 'Rock Solid' Youth group at St Peter and St Paul's Church.



We have slightly revised our rewards system, thanks to a consultation led by Mrs French last Summer. In discussion with students, we now have more HousePoint rewards:

50 HousePoints = Tuck voucher

100 HousePoints = Holywell Pen

200 HousePoints = 200-hundred club – time to 'chill out' with friends and Heads of House. We have regular House Group meetings and our four Heads of House (Miss Mayles [St Andrew], Mrs French [St David], Miss Martin [St George] and Mr Johnson [St Patrick]) lead House Worship.

Our new Year 5s have settled in really well and we're just starting the process of looking at applications for 2023-2024 ... students will be helping out at our Open Evening on Wednesday  $2^{nd}$  November – full details on our website.



... and that's just some of the highlights of the half term – I haven't mentioned the brilliant Year 7 trip to Kingswood or the Year 6 trip to Wrest Park as they have features of their own later in the newsletter!

I hope we all have a restful half-term and I look forward to welcoming students and staff back for a brilliant second half-term. We have lots to look forward to.

# **Attendance and Holidays in Term Time**



Parents / Carers should be aware that under current government guidelines we can <u>NOT</u> give permission for any holiday in term time. Holidays will be classed as unauthorised absence for your child. There may, however, be events that a student takes part in out of school which require him / her to miss a school day – we will continue to consider that sort of request. However, it is clear that the government and external authorities will want a very persuasive argument for us to be allowed to record any absence as a permitted

time out of school. <u>No</u> leave will be authorised during the <u>first two weeks of the school year</u> or during <u>exam periods</u>.

Parents/carers wishing to apply for leave of absence are required to fill in a Leave of Absence Application Form <u>in advance</u> and before making any travel arrangements (available from the school office and to download from the school website). We always take a reasonable, supportive approach to requests (especially with regard to fines) however, taking 'the odd day' here and there can have a HUGE impact on learning.

### **WEDUC Communications from School**



**WEDUC** is the web-based messaging app we use to communicate with home. Designed with parents in mind, Weduc is a flexible and user-friendly mobile app that is perfect for keeping the whole-school community, up to date.

From emergency notifications and school messaging, to student attendance and payments for school trips, Weduc brings all the tools needed to communicate with parents/carers into one single platform. 
# **Essential Equipment**

We will be hosting a **Scholastic Book Fair** at Holywell from: **16 - 23 November** 



# **News from the Maths Department!**



This year, for only the second time ever, we have some Holywell students taking part in the National Cipher Challenge. We last entered a number of students three years ago, just before Covid hit, with great success, so were very pleased that, yet again, following an invitation to enter, a number of our students put themselves forward, 'Daring to do!', and accepted this very difficult challenge.

The National Cipher Challenge has been run by the University of Southampton Mathematics Department since 2002 and since then has attracted a number of fans. These include two Foreign Secretaries; the media scientists Adam Hart-Davis and Simon Singh among others. Many past competitors have gone on to careers in cyber security and others have followed other paths using the mathematics and other skills they learned tackling the fiendish challenges.

These last few weeks, two teams of Year 8 pstudents have been preparing for the challenge using resources in their lunch and home time to teach themselves decryption methods and have started to decipher passages written in code. There are nine weekly challenges in total. The first was released on the 6th October, and they are now on their third, having successfully completed the first two challenges.

It was said by Niels Ferguson, one of the leading cryptographers of his generation, that cryptography was "just about the most fun you can have with mathematics". We agree with that sentiment and, with a little encouragement, hope that the Cipher Challenge will convince some of our students too.

In particular, I would like to thank Harry Nicholas and Amelia-Faye Parry for taking on the responsibility of captaining our two teams. They have been involved in setting up and registering the teams and are responsible for ensuring their team's submissions are made before each deadline. We wish all those involved every success in this new endeavour and look forward to updating you later in the year.

Although we just fell short of a place in the final, we came home with a Bronze after a close match. ## HISTORY DEPARTMENT NEWS

Year 5 have been busy learning history skills whilst finding out about the history of Cranfield village. Most groups have already undertaken a walk around the village to compare old photos with what exists today. The last two groups will hopefully be able to go the first week back.



In Year 6 students have immersed themselves in Anglo-Saxon history and produced a creative writing piece for display based on one aspect of Anglo-Saxon life.

Year 7 students have just completed their first 'essay' style question explaining why William I won the battle of Hastings. All the students worked really hard on this and many produced some excellent work!

Our year 8 students completed some amazingly creative pop-up style booklets about the agrarian revolution and we will be rewarding some of them for their great efforts next half term. They have now moved on to look at the industrial revolution and are learning about the many harsh and cruel realities of life in an industrial factory.



# RE DEPARTMENT NEWS

Our Year 5 students have been learning about key Old Testament stories such as creation, Abraham and Isaac and Moses and the Ten Commandments. They are moving on next half term to look more closely at the Jewish religion.

In Year 6 students have been analysing the teachings of Jesus that relate to love and peace. They have learnt about conscientious objectors and how Christianity influences actions of humans in the world today.



Our Year 7 students have been learning all about Islam and are completing an extended piece of work based on the 5 pillars of Islam.

In Year 8 students are embarking on a detailed examination of evidence for and against the existence of God. Later in the term they will be debating this evidence and forming and defending their own ideas based on what they have learned. We are hoping to host a debating competition to end the unit with prizes for the winning debate team! Watch this space for further details!

# **Year 7 Residential Visit**

Earlier this term 125 year 7 pupils had a 3-day residential visit to an outdoor adventure centre. Here pupils were able to challenge themselves and enjoy working as a team. They enjoyed activities such as zip wire, leap of faith, fencing, shelter building etc. All had a great time developing greater relationships.
