

## **Summer Uniform**

**During the summer term** (after Easter) students have the following two options re: uniform:

- a) Either continue to wear blazers, white shirts and ties.
- b) Wear a white polo shirt (without a tie) and a blazer

**Shorts:** School shorts are now an option all throughout the year ... however, we know that they are more popular in the Summer Term ... so just a reminder about style and length: The length should be just above the knee to just below the knee. The shorts must be plain grey tailored shorts (ie. no combat style shorts, skinny / cycling shorts, or shorts with pockets further down the leg; no designs / appliqué or stripes; no denims, cord, linen, combats or cropped trousers allowed).



- As with school shorts, skirts must be pleated and just above the knee to just below the knee in length.
- Socks must be plain grey, black or white.
- Shoes are required as part of our school uniform.
- PE Kit to be worn on days when PE lessons are scheduled.

### PRACTICAL REMINDERS

- **Hydration Guidance**: All students should have a water bottle (labelled) and they are encouraged to take regular sips during the day.
  - Bottles must be anti-spill bottles NOT GLASS with sports tops
  - Water bottles should be carried separately from school books and library books
  - Water bottles are not allowed near electrical equipment
  - Water bottles and drinks must be for personal use only
  - o Teachers have the final word in lessons as to when and if they can be used
  - Bottles must contain still WATER! Flavoured still water or sugar-free squash is also an acceptable alternative, however, water is best! (Fizzy drinks – including sparkling water drinks or power drinks – are not allowed in school.)
- Uniform If you are refreshing uniform, please make sure that the correct uniform
  is purchased. Make sure that shoes are shoes (no trainers)! Trousers and skirts
  should be grey and not black; skirts should be the correct length.
- Chewing Gum Chewing gum is not allowed and should not be brought into school.
- Mobile Phone Policy Reminder that we are a non-smart-phone school. Smart
  phones are not to be brought on-site. Non-smart phones for communicating with
  parents out of school hours are allowed with a permission slip and are the
  responsibility of the child. If smart-phones are found on-site, they will be
  confiscated and will need to be collected by a parent. Full policy on the website.
- Behaviour To / From school and on the buses we expect the same high standards of student behaviour on the bus and walking to and from school.
   Students should also make sure they are behaving safely at all times – eg. seat belts on, walking a safe distance away from the pavement, not crossing in front of vehicles, etc.
- Haircuts Keep it professional! No fashion cuts, no lines or patterns, no colours, nothing shorter than Grade #2.

## The new Reach More Parents App is here!



Weduc has redesigned their App and it is now called: "Reach More Parents by WEDUC". There are major enhancements to the layout, accessibility, and general ease of use.

What do I need to do as a parent? If your phone has automatic updates turned on, there is nothing you need to do, as the app will update automatically on 03/04/2023. If you do not have automatic updates turned on, you will need to redownload the app from the App Store if you have an iPhone or the Google Play Store if you have an Android.

**Can I still access the same features?** Yes. The features you already use such as Newsfeed, Absence Reporting and Messaging are still accessible.

**What's new?** You can find a PDF document on your Weduc notice board which will give you a detailed breakdown of everything that has changed in the app.

## **Attendance and Holidays in Term Time**



Parents / Carers should be aware that under current government guidelines we can <u>NOT</u> give permission for any holiday in term Holidays will be classed as unauthorised absence for your child. There may, however, be events that a student takes part in out of school which require him / her to miss a school day – we will continue to consider that sort of request. However, it is clear that the government and external

authorities will want a very persuasive argument for us to be allowed to record any absence as a permitted time out of school. <u>No</u> leave will be authorised during the <u>first two weeks of the school year</u> or during <u>exam periods</u>.

Parents/carers wishing to apply for leave of absence are required to fill in a Leave of Absence Application Form at least 4 weeks in advance and before making any travel arrangements (available from the school office and to download from the school website). We always take a reasonable, supportive approach to requests (especially with regard to fines) however, there are an increasing number of families taking 'the odd day' here and there ... this is having a HUGE impact on learning.

If you are unable to pay online or by card please contact the school office.


#### Parent Pay (Payment for tuck/school dinners)


The Masked Reader was a form time activity where staff at Holywell read the blurb of their favourite book. However, their face and their voice were in disguise! The children had so much fun

## From the Maths Department



Earlier in the year we reported that some of our students were taking part in the 2022 National Cipher Challenge run by Southampton University. The students devoted time both in and outside of school learning about the practice and study of techniques for

communication. It was lovely to see the fun they had and watching them explore a different side of maths to that which we usually learn in the classroom, and experiencing the elation of finally understanding a difficult cipher - a feeling that can be hard to beat! We hope the challenge also gave them a taste of how much more there is to maths and that the subject continues to amaze and excite.

With this competition being open to individuals up to the age of 18, our hope was that they might do well on the early rounds and that would spark a desire and prepare them for further achievement in future competitions. (This is a competition that students can enter as part of a school or by themselves. So hopefully, it is something that they will choose to take part in in future years, either individually, or working with others as part of a team). Thus, we are very proud of the progress that our students made, making it as far as rounds 5 and 6, being able to successfully complete a number of the challenges.

Our thanks and congratulations go to all the students who took part, namely, Emma Vaughan, Izzy Perrin, Amelia-Faye Parry, Isla-Jayne Harris, Harry Nicholas and Charlie Davies.

In addition, on the back of this competition, we started a Thursday lunchtime Code Club for students in Key Stage 2. #### **Science News**

As we come to the end of the spring term, we celebrate together and reflect on the experiences that have helped us to learn and grow.

Year Five began the term learning about many aspects of space. From the awe and wonder of the planets in our solar system to the phases of the Moon and much more! Our 'Forces' topic gave Year Five the opportunity to investigate magnetism, upthrust, friction and gravity. Students built their own gyrocopter and investigated the effect of air resistance.



Year Six started the term learning about 'animals including humans'. They took a close look at habitats, adaptations, and the classification system. Our 'Electricity and Circuits' topic quickly followed. Students learned about the dangers of



electricity and how to work safely. They investigated circuits and enjoyed using various components to build a steady hand game.

Year Seven started the term investigating the

properties of light. It was an interesting topic that gave insight into the

processes of reflection and refraction. Many students were fascinated to learn about how the eye works and were fortunate to dissect a real eye! Their learning journey continued with a topic on reproduction. Here the students considered the



miracle of life. A sense of awe and wonder developed as we learned just how special life is.



Year Eight began the term learning about energy resources. From the formation of fossil fuels and their importance in the industrial revolution to our modern-day thirst for energy. Students explored the development of renewable, alternative energy resources as a way of becoming more sustainable. A really important area of study – I'm sure you'll agree! Many were excited to move onto our chemistry topics 'The Periodic Table' and 'Separation techniques. Practical investigation is at the heart of our science curriculum and the students were

delighted to experiment; looking for trends in the reactivity of elements.

We look forward to the summer term and continuing our learning journey together. Happy Easter!

We have been super busy in History this term as Year 5 have immersed themselves into Greek history and learned about the bitter rivalry between Sparta and Athens! Their historical skills have been developing really well with many gaining excellent scores in their end of term assessments.



In Year 6 we have now completed our topic on the Vikings. The students really enjoyed the visit from Ash, in full Viking regalia! They got to handle weaponry, see artefacts and learn more about the skills and lifestyle of the fascination group of people.

Our Year 7 students have begun learning about the Tudors and have been fascinated by the story of Henry VIII and his divorce from Catherine of Aragon and marriage to Anne Boleyn!



Several Year 8 students took part in an overnight visit to Ironbridge earlier on in the term, visiting Blists Hill where time has stood still and actors talk about their lives, in authentic costume. Students got to experience education Victorian style in a special workshop and soon realised

their life at Holywell is not so bad after all!

We also visited the Enginuity museum where students enjoyed learning about the mechanics of the

revolution in a fun, hands-on way! We have now moved on to start our new topic on the Transatlantic Slave Trade.



## **RE Department News**

Our Year 5 have been exploring the life of Jesus including some key pieces of teaching and miracle stories. They have learnt a lot about symbolism and why believers claim Jesus was the son of God.

In Year 6 students have studied Sikhism and gained a detailed understanding of the history and practices of this most modern world religion.

Our Year 7's have embarked on a unit entitled 'Salvation' that explores Christian beliefs about heaven and hell and how Jesus' death is believed to have saved mankind.

Finally, students in Year 8 have explored the ancient and very culturally diverse faith of Hinduism, learning about their rites of passage and comparing them to those within the Christian faith.

organised by Inspiring Music and the band were expertly coached by Mr Tabert and Mr Probert. They performed the Beatles classic 'Twist and Shout'.






Year 5 have completed their Matisse inspired cut outs this term. They have really considered their composition and their use of shape and space!










She was coached by some of the England coaches and her team was helped by Lucy's sister, who assisted them. They were playing a year up from her normal age group, playing in the under 11s. Lucy also managed to meet a Leicester City player (Ryan Bertrand). She slept in rooms where England players stay and ate where they go to eat, even using their hydro pool. What an amazing experience!! Her team came 2nd in her group, so they got a medal!



Another student tasting sporting success is **Caleb Widger** in Year 7. Over the last 3 months Caleb has participated in 2 Order of Merit Winter Series (one for his golf club Bedfordshire and one which is organised by Bedfordshire County). Each consist of approximately 10 x 18 hole matches with an average of 15-20 competitors. Caleb won the runner up Order of Merit using the top 4 cards using the handicap system (to do this he



won one (Pavenham), came 2nd (Beds & County Championship Course) in one and 3rd in two events (Dunstable Downs and John O Gaunt) and he actually won the Dunstable Downs event! He was also entered into the Order of Merit and Division 2 Leagues at Bedfordshire Golf Club (Stagsden). Caleb won the Order of Merit and Division 2 League at the club 2 weeks ago and was highlighted in the Club's newsletter. Caleb has worked really hard to bring his handicap down from 54 to 32.7 over the last year and has won these Order of Merits because he consistently has played under his handicap (around 28). 
