This year, we are celebrating 50 years of Holywell School.

On Friday 20th October, we had a day of celebration activities in which we learned about the history of Holywell, we created collaborative artwork all based around the number 50 which will be part of a whole-school art installation, and we had cake! We had planned to do our annual Thrift Sponsored walk, however, the weather intervened and

we have had to re-schedule that until after half-term!

The first cohort of students joined the school in September 1973. Initially, there just below 100 students on roll and only 8 classrooms! There was an 8-period day – 40 mins each - and school ended at 4pm. Regular lessons included Maths, English, Science, Maths, PE/Games, Geography, History and RE but there was no PSHE, Drama, Art, Music, French, ICT or DT!

Today, we have 730 students, 34 classrooms (including Science Labs, specialist DT, Art and ICT rooms), a Gym and a Sports Hall. We have a 5-period day and lessons are 55/60 minutes each. The school day finishes at 3.40pm. Regular lessons include: Maths, English, Science, Maths, PE, Geography, History, RE, PSHE, Drama (in Year 7), Art, Music, French or German, ICT and DT.

There have been 5 Headteachers (Mr Morgan, Mr James, Mrs Chatt, Mr Haddon and myself), many teachers and many students! It is always wonderful to hear from former students and we

have already had some great anecdotes and photographs shared with us as part of our Art installation – if you have any stories or photos you are happy to share, please contact us via school@holywellschool.co.uk.

Throughout our 50 years, we have (and continue to be) proud to be a Church of England School – our Christian values driving everything we do so that all of our community can 'Live Life in all its Fullness'. Our Value of the Month is 'Thankfulness' and I am thankful to all the students, staff and families for all we have achieved this half term. I am in the midst of a local production of the musical 'Godspell' and, being involved in the show, has helped me to reflect on how everyone has their part to play – in musical theatre, this involves the director, the musical director, the choreographer, the band, the performers, the lighting crew, the sound team, stage and set crew … and the audience all working together to create a 'live' dramatic experience. In school, we all have a part to play too – the students' 'job' in school is 'learning' and being learning focussed. All staff are involved in planning, preparing, delivering and evaluating our service to the students and families – all of us working together to be the best we can be in our local community so we can realise our school vision. This half term's newsletter will give you a flavour of some of the amazing things students have achieved this half term … and we are proud of all their achievements in, and out of school.

We have been refreshing our Values Boards. Students designed the Boards and our regular graffiti artist – Neil – helped to realise the designs. He worked with students from each year group – all of whom were chosen for their excellent work and attitude in the first few weeks of term.



We have also appointed our new House Captains, Sports Captains, Values Ambassadors and subject mentors. We look forward to these Year 8 students helping and supporting us throughout the year.



As part of our drive to maintain the highest standards possible, we are in the process of reviewing and enhancing our Behaviour for Learning Policy. More information will be sent out in the coming weeks with regards to this. We have already started to further utilise the messaging element of Satchel One and we hope that you have seen an improvement in how the school

communicates with you as parents and carers. We are also continuing to develop the rewards our students can potentially receive for positive behaviour. This week all of the students who have received 50 House Points or more this half term were able to collect a hot chocolate and sweet treat from their Head of House. In addition, 32 students, randomly selected from those who had not received any negative Behaviour Points and had 100% attendance, were able to take part in an hour's session at Climb Quest in Milton Keynes — thanks to Mrs Butcher for organising! (See the report later in the newsletter)

Our new mini-bus has also arrived! We have an increasing number of sports teams and this new mini-bus will enable us to get even more students involved in a whole range of extra-curricular activities.

I hope we all have a restful half-term and I look forward to welcoming students and staff back for a brilliant second half-term. We have lots to look forward to.

Attendance and Holidays in Term Time



Parents / Carers should be aware that under current government guidelines we can <u>NOT</u> give permission for any holiday in term time. Holidays will be classed as unauthorised absence for your child. There may, however, be events that a student takes part in out of school which require him / her to miss a school day – we will continue to consider that sort of request. However, it is clear that the government and external authorities will want a very persuasive argument for us to be allowed to record any absence as a permitted

time out of school. <u>No</u> leave will be authorised during the <u>first two weeks of the school year or during exam periods</u>.

Parents/carers wishing to apply for leave of absence are required to fill in a Leave of Absence Application Form in advance and before making any travel arrangements (available from the school office and to download from the school website). We always take a reasonable, supportive approach to requests (especially with regard to fines) however, taking 'the odd day' here and there can have a HUGE impact on learning.

Please remember to inform the school office of any changes to your address or contact telephone numbers (even temporary changes). This is important, as it enables us to reach you in case of emergency. Thank you.

ABSOLUTELY NO NUTS OR NUT PRODUCTS IN SCHOOL




Could everyone please be aware that we have several children and members of staff with severe nut allergies.


Essential Equipment

In **Year 6** students have been working on producing creative and informative empathy work on the Anglo Saxons for display. Our **Year 7** students have been enjoying finding out about the events of 1066 and how William I used dastardly tactics to instil fear into his subjects and rule them effectively.


Year 8 have produced some fabulous agrarian revolution booklets again this year, with fun and creative elements to appeal to a younger audience. They are now learning in depth about how different their lives would have been had they been working in a textile mill one hundred years ago!

The MFL department ran a very successful European Day of Languages competition. To enter, students had to make, paint or build something to represent a flag or monument of Europe or a European country.


Students have clearly worked extremely hard on their masterpieces and they have put a huge amount of effort into their entry.

Firstly, we would like to thank and congratulate every student who took the time to audition. They were all superstars!


After lots of thought and deliberation the following students have been chosen as the band's founding members:


