#### Mr Simpson's Headlines



At Holywell, our vision is that everyone in our community chooses to

"The Christian vision of Holywell School is a living reality for both pupils and adults. This is due to its effective outworking through values, aspiration and community." (SIAMS 2024)

I have been very privileged to lead this wonderful school over the last seven years. We have worked hard together to develop a Christian vision for the school which is accessible to all, inclusive in its nature, and rooted firmly and unapologetically in the values and teachings of Jesus. We still believe that it is a 'work-in-progress' to having everyone in our community live our values on a day-to-day basis and to having everyone being the best they can be at all times. It was, therefore, lovely to have an external view of where we are when we had our SIAMS Inspection at the end of January. I was particularly proud that our SIAMS Inspector commented: "The impact of the vision is felt throughout the school, particularly in warm relationships and unity of purpose. Pupils and adults flourish as they are helped to live out the vision through the school's values. There is a culture of aspiration, of being the best one can be, in all aspects of personal and communal life. Pupils and adults often refer to Holywell as a team, emphasising the tangible sense of togetherness."

We will continue to strive to make our vision a reality for everyone in our community here at Holywell and we will continue to serve you all in our community ... especially as we transition to becoming a secondary school. This transition, as you will be aware, will hopefully start in September 2026. Due to the change of date, we will need to re-run our consultation – watch out for further information. What will remain the same as we grow and develop as a school, are our ethos and values.

In addition to our SIAMS inspection, we have continued to provide students with challenging and creative learning tasks, memorable experiences and a wide range of opportunities: everything from some brilliant work in DT, a victorious Year 5 football team and our superb school band – "Nine Lives".







You can read about some of the other exciting events from the half-term and about some more to come in the rest of the newsletter. We are particularly excited about our Mental Health and Wellbeing Day on the first Friday back after half-term. We're hoping for some good weather to enable us to do our Thrift Sponsored Walk and a whole range of other activities designed to help students learn about how to manage their mental health and wellbeing. We have been exploring this already in PSHE and students have been trying out things to help them sleep well (such as turning off devices an hour before bedtime, reading and breathing exercises).

We have started our annual 'Lenten 40 Acts' challenge. For Christians, Lent is a 40-day season (not counting Sundays) which commemorates and represents Christ's time of temptation in the wilderness, where he fasted and where Satan tempted him. Lent asks believers to set aside a time each year for similar activities of reflection, prayer and,

traditionally, giving things up (fasting). In more recent times, another way of marking the 40 days is to have 40 days of action – good deeds of kindness and appreciation. This is what we have challenged everyone at Holywell to do and students have all been issued with a 40 Acts Challenge sheet. We have challenged each form class to create a 'Giving Jar' in which they can collect money together – all monies raised during our 40 Acts challenge will be donated to our partner school in Tanzania (Msijute Primary School). Some challenges are simply to carry out an act of kindness - today's challenge (16<sup>th</sup> February) was to show some appreciation to someone in our school community ... hopefully, students will do this at home too! Seeking out awe and wonder can help with our mental well-being too. Awe forces us to broaden our perspective and turn our attention away from negative thoughts that can circle in our minds. Somehow, the negative chatter that can creep up on us becomes quieter when we can connect with that 'wow' feeling of awe and wonder.




Whatever you choose to do over this half-term break, have a safe and restful week. Thank you all for your continued support.



#### **Eco Schools**

Our Year 8 Option are well on their way to completing the application for Eco Schools. This year the group is focusing on Water, Energy and Health Living.



We have Water, Energy and Recycling Monitors to help save energy where possible by closing doors, turning off lights and reporting water leaks or damaged taps straight away. The group has looked at plant-based meals and provided feedback to the school's caterers.

## **Eco Club**

We are trying to establish recycling in school as this came up as 'very poor' on the Eco schools Environmental Audit. Our recycling monitors are set to check that recycling bins are not contaminated. The main focus in Eco Club this year is to achieve the 'Schools against Plastics' Award. **To achieve this, they need your help.** 

Our children want to reduce the amount of plastic in snacks and lunch boxes. Currently none of this rubbish is recycled and ends up in the main waste, or worse, as litter in the playground.

Eco Club students have created a video for all classes to watch which gives some examples of how we can reduce the amount of single use plastics we bring into school. They would like you to really get behind them by thinking about alternative ways of wrapping food, using reusable lunch boxes, and encouraging healthier snacks like fruit. They would also like to encourage children to take their litter home so that it can be recycled through the household waste system.

Next term there will be some prizes for the best plastic free lunch and snack ideas spotted by our club members!

# If your child is away from School

A telephone call or WEDUC message is required on the <u>first day of absence</u>, <u>before 8.30 am</u>.

The Office Staff prepare the official registers and need to know the reason for <u>all</u> absences. It is therefore important that they are made aware of absences and they will inform your child's Form Teacher.



# **Emergency Contact Details**



Please remember to inform the school office of any changes to your contact details. This includes change of your home address, telephone numbers (even temporary changes) and doctors' details.

This is very important, as it enables us to reach you in case of emergency. Thank you.

# **Essential Equipment**

We are now stocking essential stationery items in the School Office.

## **No Aerosols Please**



Please remember that aerosols / sprays (deodorants, hairsprays, etc.) are NOT ALLOWED TO BE USED IN SCHOOL. We have students and staff with severe allergies to the gases and spraying such aerosols can cause severe allergic / medical reactions. Please be considerate. Thank you.

# **Attendance and Holidays in Term Time**



Parents / Carers should be aware that under current government guidelines we can <u>NOT</u> give permission for any holiday in term time. Holidays will be classed as unauthorised absence for your child.

There may, however, be events that a student takes part in out of school which require him / her to miss a school day – we will continue to consider that sort of request. However, it is clear that the government and external authorities will want a very persuasive argument for us to be allowed to record any absence

as a permitted time out of school. <u>No</u> leave will be authorised during the <u>first two</u> weeks of the school year or during <u>exam periods</u>.

<u>Absence Application Form at least 4 weeks in advance</u> of the proposed absence and before making any travel arrangements (available from the school office and to download from the school website). We always take a reasonable, supportive approach to requests (especially with regard to fines) however, there are an increasing number of families taking 'the odd day' here and there ... this is having a HUGE impact on learning.

#### Did you know....?

- There are 175 non-school days a year, 175 days to spend on family time, holidays and visits.
- Being 5 minutes late every day means 3 lost days a year of your child's education.
- Arriving after the register closes, without a valid reason, is recorded as an unauthorised absence.
