From Mr Simpson:



ALL STUDENTS RETURN TO SCHOOL ON WEDNESDAY, 4TH SEPTEMBER 2024

What a wonderful end to the term ... trips to the zoo, a colour run, the long-awaited-and-much-postponed Thrift walk, a mock wedding, Leave-taking church services on the theme of change ... and that was just this last week! We have also recently had Sports Day, Year 8 Leavers' Evening, a Music Concert and the school production of 'Bugsy Malone'.

As ever, our students have excelled and surprised us in equal measures – they have continued to be thoughtful, energetic,

responsive to challenge and truly inspiring. This time last year, we had just been through an Ofsted inspection where inspectors concluded: "Pupils at Holywell School attend a school with values rooted in its Christian ethos. They are welcoming and friendly. They take on responsibilities that make their environment and community richer and more rewarding." ... and I am delighted to say that this is still the case ... and even more so. In our SIAMS inspection at the end of January, the inspector noted: "The Christian vision of Holywell School is a living

reality for both pupils and adults. This is due to its effective outworking through values, aspiration and community. The Christian vision inspires a notably cohesive and supportive community based on mutual respect and kindness." Whilst we are proud of these observations, what is even more important is when we have feedback from parents and students about the difference our support has meant to them – a recent 'thank you' referred to "a wonderful school with so many opportunities, excellent teachers and leadership who care for them



holistically"; and the parent of a student who joined us part-way through the year said: "From the very first visit to the school, we felt incredibly welcome. The kindness, helpfulness, and thoroughness in addressing all our concerns were truly appreciated." Being thanked by our Year 8 students as they left today, is an even-bigger testament to the hard work and support staff give to ensuring that all students 'Live life in all its fullness'. Our Year 8 students have been a joy to have in school and, although there have been challenges along the way, they have been responsive, reflective and resilient (especially as they spent the first two years with us mainly in some form of lockdown). We wish them every success for the future as they leave to go to their various upper schools.

We are also excited as to what the future holds for Holywell. We are at the end of our 50th year and starting to really plan for our future transition to a secondary school. This next academic year is our last year with students joining us from Wootton Lower School. From September 2025, Wootton Lower will start transitioning to a Primary School and next year's Year 4 students will stay at the school in September 2025 as their first Year 5 cohort. We will continue to work in partnership with Cranfield Academy and will start working more closely with Marston Moreteyne Lower. We have new Admissions criteria in place for the September 2025 intake and hope to welcome more students from the local villages to Holywell moving forward. We are also negotiating hard with Central Bedfordshire to secure the best transformation/expansion plans as

we can for the school – watch out for a revised consultation document early in the Autumn Term.



Our church service today focussed on 'change' and we appreciate that for many of us, change is always a challenge. As students end this academic year, they can look forward to an exciting new year ahead of them. This will involve change – new timetables, new routines, new staff, new students, new friendships, new perspectives, new mindsets and new things to do.

Rev Isaac talked about challenges and change for 'the head, the heart and the hands' – what would we all change? What change will we make to how we think (our head)? Will we think more positively? Will we think carefully before we speak and act? What change will we make to how we feel (our hearts)? Will we be more understanding, more open, more patient? What change will we make to what we do (our hands)? Will we make things for others? Will we be less physical with each other? Will we be more 'full of grace', giving way and accommodating people? It will be interesting to review this time next year, what we have done differently and what changes we have accomplished together.

So, as we close the 50th chapter of the Holywell history, we look forward to seeing what comes next. Our immediate 'next' is to have a rest and to enjoy

a peaceful, hopefully sunny, Summer break. Enjoy the Olympics and any opportunity to do something in community with family and friends. Have a safe and restful Summer.

A huge 'Thank You' to all of our wonderful staff team ... and best wishes to staff who are moving on to new and exciting challenges:


- Mrs Dinner our Business Manager for over 21 years is retiring she has been a huge part of the Holywell family and we wish her well.

It was also the final performance of the much loved '9 Lives' key stage 3 rock band, who played for the grand finale of 'I'm a Believer' complete with audience participation. We would like to thank all the parents who attended the concert and who support the children with their instrumental lessons. Our concert programme cover this year was designed by Maya O.

Year 7 and 8 students have been using our new YUMU software to create their own House Music tracks. This cloud-based software has the advantage of allowing



students to access their work from home. We are looking forward to adding a new Grime unit of music technology into our curriculum for year 8 next year.



As a department we have extended our extra-curricular opportunities and we now have music clubs running every lunchtime and some after school. This includes orchestra, recorder club, string group, key stage 2 choir, key stage 3 choir, keyboard club, ukuleles, key stage 2 rock band and key stage 3 rock band. Attendance and Holidays in Term Time



Parents / Carers should be aware that under current government guidelines we can <u>NOT</u> give permission for any holiday in term time. Holidays will be classed as unauthorised absence for your child. There may, however, be events that a student takes part in out of school which require him / her to miss a school day – we will continue to consider that sort of request. However, it is clear that the government and external authorities will want a very persuasive argument for us to be allowed to record any absence as a permitted

time out of school. No leave will be authorised during the first two weeks of the school year or during exam periods.

Parents/carers wishing to apply for leave of absence are required to fill in a Leave of Absence Application Form in advance and before making any travel arrangements (available from the school office and to download from the school website). We always take a reasonable, supportive approach to requests (especially with regard to fines) however, taking 'the odd day' here and there can have a HUGE impact on learning.

News from the History Department

History News

Year 5 have had a fun term learning about the Romans. This was brought alive by their visit from a Roman centurion! They had great fun passing round Roman weaponry and artefacts and did a super job of learning how to make a shield wall and march on the enemy!



Year 6 have been learning about the Ancient Maya and have developed their decision-making skills by deciding whether to attack, trade or play Pok-ta-Pok with rival city states!

In Year 7 many of our students brought their learning of Tudor history to life by visiting Stratford Upon Avon. They had great fun finding out more about Tudor crime and punishment, the Globe Theatre and the Great plague of 1666! In the classroom we have been finishing the unit by learning about the English Civil War and considering whether Oliver Cromwell was a hero or a villain!

Our Year 8 students have embraced our final unit on women's suffrage with great passion! It has been interesting to find out their thoughts on the suffrage movement and it has caused considerable

divisions between those on the suffragist and those on the suffragette side! We wish our Year 8's all the best as they move on to Upper school in September.

News from the RE Department

The RE department has been busy this term teaching students in Year 5 about different places of worship in lots of different religions, looking at the similarities and differences between them and how each religion's place of worship represents the holiness of God. Students have also been learning about the features and functions of churches and the roles and jobs of monks and nuns in monasteries.

Students in Year 7 have been learning about Racism & Discrimination, influential people such as Martin Luther King Jr, Gandhi and Nelson Mandela and how they all campaigned to end racism. We have been talking about how racism could be eradicated, how it still exists and who has the power to eradicate it for good. Students have worked exceptionally well writing speeches to present their own ideas to award a 'posthumous' award for the best campaigner for justice.

Students in Year 8 have been learning about ethical issues surrounding Justice & Poverty, collating evidence to suggest who is to blame and why! Students have been researching how the Bible discusses Justice & Poverty and what actions could be implemented to make the world more equal and fairer. Students have been working exceptionally hard, debating, writing speeches and providing solutions to end poverty in the world today.

Students in Year 6 have been completing "The Island", in which we 'crash landed' on a deserted island and people from all different religions and cultures had to live together and learn about different religious ceremonies.

Students have learnt about coming of age ceremonies, birthing and naming ceremonies and the unit culminated with a 'mock wedding', involving the entire year group attending a 'mock wedding' at St Peter & St Paul's Church in Cranfield. Students worked exceptionally well in the build up to the big day, writing speeches for mother and father of the bride, bride, groom, best man and maid of honour. The Island unit has been really well received by all students and I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate all students who were part of the wedding party for doing such a fantastic job this year and all students in the year group who wrote speeches, poems, words of wisdom, this was the BEST year yet!!

Science Department News

As we come to the end of the academic year, we reflect and look forward to the future with ambition and a determination to achieve personal success. In September, we look


forward to expanding our amazing team of Science teachers and welcome Miss Jude into the department.

In the final term, Year Five students engaged brilliantly with our topic on 'life cycles' learning about the life cycles of plants and animals. The students found out about seed dispersal methods, pollination, germination, fruit formation and produced some wonderful flower dissections. During our recent end of year trip to Whipsnade,



our students visited the butterfly house and got to see first-hand the amazing life cycle of butterflies. A great opportunity to see in real life what we have been learning about in lessons.

Year Six continued their work on 'Living things and their habitats' and 'Light and Sight.' They delved into the world of evolution and inheritance. Students looked at the work of



Mary Anning – the great fossil hunter and

discovered how fossils were made. They found out about the story of the Peppered moths during




the industrial revolution and how natural selection leads to evolution. The students

researched, collaborated and produced superb presentations about Charles Darwin. Amazing work, Year Six!

In the 'Light' topic, students recreated a famous experiment by Sir Isaac Newton to split light into its spectrum of colours. It really was a 'WOW!' moment when the students put on some special refraction glasses and discovered the world around us is illuminated by a rainbow of colours. They investigated the properties of light, mirrors, shadows, and reflection. We congratulate Year Six for reaching the end of Key Stage Two and give our best wishes to those students moving to a new school. For those who are continuing their education at Holywell, we look forward to developing our scientific knowledge and understanding together in Key Stage Three!

Year Seven students studied 'Reactions'; building on the work they did in Year Five and Six. An intense focus on practical skills enabled the students to develop their approach to working scientifically. Investigations into burning, conservation of mass, exothermic/endothermic reactions, and thermal decomposition helped to reinforce the importance of working collaboratively. The sight and sound of a screaming jelly baby and elephant's toothpaste were certainly well-received!



In their final half term at Holywell, Year Eight students focussed on 'Green plants', and 'Adaptation and inheritance'. In the Green plants' topic, students investigated seed germination, conducted a bean dissection, tested leaves for starch and fruits for glucose, and learned about seed dispersal methods. In their work on adaptation and inheritance, the students looked at variation and how it occurs, how we inherit our characteristics, natural selection and

survival of the fittest, and extinction of species.

We would like to take this opportunity to wish all Year Eight students the very best for the next stage of their learning journey. As we say goodbye, we are safe in the knowledge that they are well-prepared for the challenges of upper school. We hope that every student aims high, works hard, and seizes every opportunity. Good luck Year Eight...The Class of 2024!

Wild for Life





- Exposure to authentic age-appropriate language which is a valuable cultural experience.

- Performance in another language is about more than accuracy, it is about conveying emotion, mood, tone, about storytelling skills and non-verbal language.
- Developing memorisation strategies which is a valuable skill across many subjects.
- Cultural skills are important in their own right: pupils appreciate a piece of language for its beauty or cultural relevance.

Well done to Ruhani and Elizabeth for their confidence and superb performance! They stood in front of a large number of students and teachers from other schools and delivered their chosen text in French faultlessly.
